SIGHT / phanopoeia

- simple picture, a thing seen or heard or felt or tasted or touched or otherwise sensually represented; dreams, fantasies, memories; specific image detail is the heart and soul of all poetry

metaphor - figure that asserts identity of two disparate elements - A=B; direct comparison

simile - indirect comparison using like or as

figure - image + idea ("bud of love"); tropes

conceit - an extended figure, ingenious development

SOUND / melopoeia

- internal rhyme of vowel sounds (a-e-i-o-u), purest lyric sound as in diphthong (double vowel sound) = oasis, aereal, digretic, dour &c

alliteration - repetition of consonant sounds: PLOSIVES (p-b): DENTALS (t-d-th); SIBILANTS (s-sh-z); NASALS (m-n-ng); FRICATIVES (f-v); GUTTURALS (g-k)

<u>rhyme</u> - any sense of resonance that echoes patternings of sound - PERFECT, SLANT, FALSE, MA\$CULINE, FEMININE (go-know/going-knowing)

<u>caesura</u> - breath pause, usually enforced; classical alexandrines, or when word ends with same letter next word begins with (fairest/stars; its/surcease/success)

SENSE / logopoeia

denotation - dictionary meaning of word (mother) - puns turn on denotation

connetation - associative meaning of word (mother) - irony, sarcasm- ambiguity

personification - using persona, assumed voice, fictional mask or point of view

diction - WORD CHOICE - SLANG/PATOIS/ARGOT to PLAIN STYLE to LITERARY/RHETORICAL - LATINATE/ANGLO-SAXON/REGIONALISMS + DIALECTS + VERNACULAR

- SENTENCE STRUCTURES = simple/compound/complex/compound-complex
DECLARATIVE/EXCLAMMATORY/INTERROGATIVE/IMPERATIVE

paradox - opposite of what is expected; oxymoron - dry ice is so cold it's hot

rhetoric - "ANY ADORNMENT OR INFLATION OF LANGUAGE WHICH IS NOT DONE FOR A PARTICULAR EFFECT BUT FOR A GENERAL IMPRESSIVENESS" - T. S. Eliot

tone - total effect of style, coloration and texture of language

voice - poet's stance in poem, an inimitable way of saying something
